Malanka New Year's Dance

Held in mid-January at and might be sponsored by various Ukrainian Community organizations. The annual dance is celebrated according to the "Old Calendar" New Year and has been a community tradition for decades.

UCOWPA Zapusty/Pre-Lenten Dance

Held annually just before the Great Lent fast.

Annual Ukrainian Easter Egg Sale (Pysanky) at SS Peter & Paul Ukrainian Orthodox Church, Carnegie, PA

First held in 1966, the Pysanky Sale has become a Western Pennsylvania tradition and patrons lined up around the block waiting for the sale to begin. The event is held annually on Western Palm Sunday and features over 1,500 eggs decorated in traditional Ukrainian designs that date back centuries as well as modern interpretations.

UCOWPA Ukrainian Film Festival

Held annually each autumn, the festival features a selection of contemporary films from Ukraine or about Ukrainian topics. The Ukrainian Cultural and Humanitarian Institute (UCHI)

UCHI's mission is to develop relationships between the US and Ukraine on cultural, educational, and humanitarian levels. It also serves to develop cross-cultural understanding between the peoples of the US and Ukraine.

It serves three constituencies: Ukrainians in Ukraine seeking to build democratic structures in Ukraine, Ukrainians in America, and others interested in learning about modern Ukraine.

The Ukrainian Humanitarian Relief Fund (UHRF)

UHRF was created in March 2022 to accept monetary donations for grants providing humanitarian aid arising from the 2022 Russian Federation military invasion of the sovereign nation of Ukraine. UHRF's purpose is to provide humanitarian aid, immigration, and relocation assistance to further the safety and wellbeing of Ukrainian affected persons, both within and without Ukraine and the United States, including all related and incidental purposes. Working in partnership with the Pittsburgh Ukrainian Relief Coalition (PURC), the Ukrainian Cultural and Humanitarian Institute (UCHI) is the fiduciary for this fund.

UCHI's Ukrainian Refugee Information Exchange

The information exchange is a two-part program to assist refugees from Ukraine settling in the Pittsburgh area.

Part I features an online resource database detailing the needs of refugees, organizations providing assistance to refugees and tools available to assist refugees.

Part II consists of a series of in-person networking events involving refugees and the various representatives providing assistance.

Ukrainian immigrants, who settled in the Pittsburgh region settled near the coal mines, steel mills, railroads, and factories scattered throughout the Southwestern portion of the state of Pennsylvania. As such, their communities were built near these employment centers in the time before automobiles were widely owned. This led to a decentralized settlement of Ukrainians in the Pittsburgh region, which exists to this day.

The first Ukrainians arrived in Pittsburgh in 1880, attracted by job offers in local mines and steel mills. The community quickly grew, attracting significant numbers of immigrants from each of the four major waves of immigration from Ukraine (1880 - 1914; 1920s; 1950s; and 1991 - present). Today, more than 40,000 people in the Pittsburgh metropolitan area trace their heritage to Ukraine. The largest areas of Ukrainian settlement today are located in Carnegie, the South Side, McKees Rocks, McKeesport, Ambridge, and Aliquippa.
